Reflecting on 2025, it has been a year of collaboration and progress, guided by SMA's core priorities – advocacy, professional development and member support. We worked closely with stakeholders, advanced initiatives that strengthened the profession, and prepared for the challenges and opportunities of an evolving healthcare landscape.

2025 was also another strong year for SMA in terms of our membership. Approximately 3,700 membership applications were processed, and SMA now represents 59% of all medical practitioners in Singapore. This growth strengthens SMA's ability to speak credibly on issues affecting the profession, underscoring the trust placed in SMA by the medical profession.

Advocacy is a cornerstone of SMA's work. During the legislative process leading to the enactment of the Health Information Act in 2025, SMA engaged the Ministry of Health and stakeholders to convey ground concerns, particularly in relation to data governance, cybersecurity readiness and the operational realities faced by clinics. Together with the Academy of Medicine, Singapore and the College of Family Physicians Singapore, SMA advocated for proportionate regulatory requirements and meaningful support to safeguard patient interests without unduly burdening healthcare providers. We also represented members' views on private healthcare insurance through the Multilateral Health Insurance Committee, public commentaries and formal correspondence.

Supporting doctors across different stages of their career remains a priority. The SMA Doctors-in-Training Committee focused on advancing junior doctors' professional

development and well-being through online workshops, digital resources, engagement platforms and collaborative initiatives. These efforts reflect SMA's commitment to nurturing the next generation of doctors and ensuring a sustainable medical workforce.

I would also like to share an important development concerning SMA's long-term operational stability. The SMA Secretariat has historically operated from rented premises, resulting in multiple relocations over the past decade. It remains unclear whether the current premises will be available beyond the next two to three years. In this context, SMA acquired office space at Paya Lebar Square in October 2025. The space is currently leased, and this arrangement will continue for as long as it remains financially prudent. This acquisition represents a measured step towards long-term stability and responsible financial stewardship.

I would like to thank the Council, committee members, volunteers and Secretariat staff for their dedication, and our members for their continued trust and support. As we step into 2026, SMA remains committed to championing the profession, enhancing member support and shaping a future-ready healthcare system. Thank you for your trust and partnership.

Honorary Secretary's REPORT

2025 was a productive year for SMA, marked by sustained advocacy, expanded professional development and ongoing member engagement. SMA contributed members' perspectives in key discussions and advanced initiatives supporting doctors and patients in Singapore's healthcare landscape. The key highlights are summarised below; please refer to the relevant sections for further details.

Advocacy and Policy Engagement

SMA maintained regular dialogue with the Ministry of Health (MOH) and other stakeholders on matters affecting medical practice, including private healthcare insurance and health data governance. Through our representation on the Multilateral Health Insurance Committee, SMA conveyed members' concerns regarding turnover of panel specialists, transparency of insurer-hospital arrangements, and clearer communication on changes affecting cover and claims. We also shared our views in the media, highlighting the importance of balanced policies that protect patients while preserving professional autonomy.

The proposed Health Information Bill, which has since been gazetted and come into force as an Act, featured prominently in SMA's policy engagements in 2025. SMA provided feedback grounded in clinical realities, particularly around data protection, cybersecurity requirements and implementation timelines. Together with the Academy of Medicine, Singapore (AMS) and the College of Family Physicians Singapore, the three professional bodies highlighted the need for practical compliance expectations and adequate funding support, especially for smaller practices with limited resources. SMA will continue exploring ways to support members as implementation details are developed.

Professional Development and Education

Professional development remained a core pillar of SMA's activities. The SMA Centre for Medical Ethics and Professionalism (SMA CMEP) organised nine mandatory medical ethics (MME) continuing medical education (CME) programmes and 17 online distance-learning courses, with over 28,000 MME points credited. These efforts helped members to meet Singapore Medical Council's new CME requirements while accessing relevant and high-quality educational content. SMA CMEP will expand its MME offerings in 2026. Following a successful inaugural run in 2025, the *Singapore Medical Journal (SMJ)* launched the second edition of the *SMJ* Editorial Fellowship in January 2026. This one-year programme continues *SMJ*'s commitment to nurturing early clinician-researchers through structured mentorship in manuscript review, peer review and editorial processes. In collaboration with the Medical Association of South East Asian Nations (MASEAN) Group of Journals, *SMJ* also organised an online webinar on effective peer review, contributing to capacity-building within the regional research community.

The Healthcare Administrators Interest Group continued to grow its activities, hosting engagement sessions and launching a mentorship programme to support doctors interested in healthcare administration and leadership pathways.

Supporting Junior Doctors and Medical Students

The SMA Doctors-in-Training (DIT) Committee supported junior doctors through engagement platforms and collaborative initiatives. The Committee formed a joint workgroup with the AMS College of Psychiatrists and College of Public Health and Occupational Physicians to develop guidelines supporting doctors with psychiatric conditions. Expected to be published in 2026, these guidelines mark an important step towards promoting well-being and inclusivity within the profession. The year concluded with a dinner co-organised with MOH Holdings, attended by about 280 junior doctors, in appreciation of their dedication and resilience.

Membership fees are waived for students. In the past year, SMA continued outreach efforts through recruitment talks at local medical schools and support for the National Medical Students Convention. SMA also recognised student achievements through selected student awards at the three local medical schools.

Through the SMA Charity Fund, 46 bursaries totalling \$276,000 were awarded to medical students requiring financial assistance in 2025. This support helps ease their financial burdens during medical school and reflects SMA's ongoing commitment to supporting the next generation of doctors.

Member Engagement and Community-Building

Our member engagement extends beyond professional activities. The SMA Annual Dinner was held on 17 May 2025, with Guest of Honour Ms Lai Wei Lin, Permanent Secretary (Policy & Development), MOH. We also presented the SMA Honorary Membership to Prof Ho Lai Yun and Prof Tay Boon Keng.

2025 also saw a record number of social and networking events organised, with events held almost every month. Highlights included sake tasting and jade appreciation activities, durian parties, Audi test drives and financial talks. This year's SMA Members' Appreciation Movie Night featuring *Avatar: Fire and Ash* was fully subscribed. Sporting events were also well received by members, with the SMA Golf Tournament attracting just over 100 golfers. At the 2025 Inter-Professional Games, our members delivered strong performances across multiple sports, with our chess team clinching the championship title. SMA also successfully held an inaugural overseas golf trip to Bangkok, Thailand.

International Relations

SMA is a member of three regional/international bodies: MASEAN, the Confederation of Medical Associations in Asia and Oceania, and the World Medical Association. As the host of the MASEAN Secretariat, SMA supported the 20th MASEAN Mid-Term Meeting held in Chonburi, Thailand. The theme of the meeting, "Harmful Inhalational Volatile Substances: with Special Reference to E-cigarettes and Cannabis", reflects an area of increasing public health concern.

SMA also welcomed visiting medical associations in Singapore during the year, including the Kuala Lumpur branch of the Malaysian Medical Association and the Hong Kong Medical Association. These meetings enable meaningful discussion on our respective healthcare systems and foster collegiality, strengthening our professional connections.

Organisational and Operational Updates

We held a retreat for SMA Council members and Secretariat staff this year, providing a platform for the Council and Secretariat to review workstreams, align priorities and plan ahead. In support of long-term operational planning, the Association also took steps towards securing a permanent office space at Paya Lebar Square. The space is currently leased while SMA continues operating from its rented premises, pending lease expiry.

Honorary Treasurer's REPORT

The SMA Group ended the financial year with a surplus of \$873,902 before tax. SMA's financial position remains sound, supported by prudent financial management and careful stewardship of resources.

SMA has recorded higher surpluses in recent years. As these outcomes were supported by a confluence of specific factors, the surpluses should be considered in their respective contexts. The Council remains mindful that such results may not be the long-term norm and will continue to plan conservatively.

The Investment Committee followed through on earlier plans to acquire commercial office space as part of our long-term planning. Taking into account the interest rate environment and the longer-term value of property ownership, the purchase was funded through a combination of reserves and bank financing to maintain liquidity and operational flexibility while supporting prudent reserves management.

Revenue streams were derived from membership subscriptions, professional development programmes and services rendered to third parties. These were boosted by continued membership growth and sustained uptake of SMA's mandatory medical ethics continuing medical education programmes, which are complimentary for members. This reflects the programmes' continued relevance and the value of SMA membership.

The Council maintained close oversight of income, expenditure and reserves, directing resources towards strategic priorities in advocacy, professional education, member engagement and operational needs. Regular reviews ensured commitments were met and adequate reserves were maintained for long-term sustainability.

The audited financial statements provide a detailed account of the Association's financial performance and position. The Council is satisfied that the accounts present a true and fair view of SMA's finances and that appropriate accounting standards have been applied.

I would like to thank my Honorary Assistant Treasurer, Adj Asst Prof Raj Kumar Menon, for his steadfast support, as well as the Finance team and the Secretariat for their diligence in managing the Association's finances. I also thank our auditors for their professional guidance throughout the year.

Finally, the Council is grateful for members' continued support of SMA. Membership subscriptions

remain an important revenue stream that supports SMA's operations and enables members to enjoy complimentary or subsidised rates for selected courses, activities and services. We hope you will encourage your colleagues and peers to join SMA, as a well-supported professional body is better able to represent a broader spectrum of the profession and strengthen our collective advocacy for doctors, patients and Singapore's healthcare landscape.

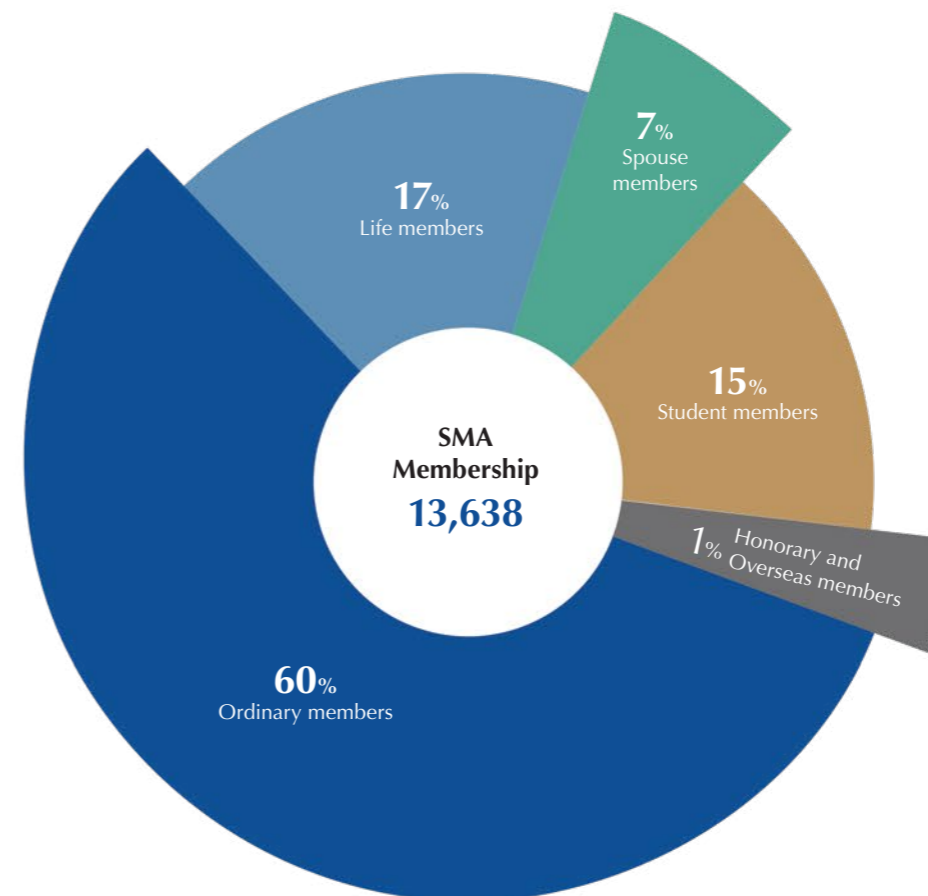

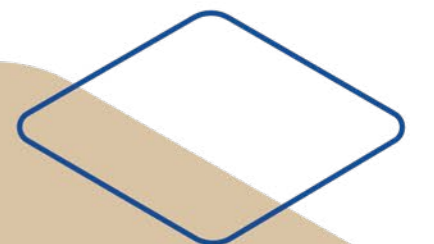

Advocating FOR THE PROFESSION

SMA continued to advocate for improvements to the healthcare ecosystem. Our advocacy tools include lobbying relevant stakeholders, providing media statements and letters to the press, conducting surveys and organising events.

Health Information Act

The proposed Health Information Bill, passed in January 2026, will require all licensed healthcare providers, including private clinics, clinical laboratories and radiological services, to contribute selected health information to the National Electronic Health Record.

SMA provided feedback to the Ministry of Health (MOH) regarding the proposed bill and the Cyber and Data Security Guidelines. Together with the Academy of Medicine, Singapore (AMS) and the College of Family Physicians Singapore (CFPS), SMA provided feedback in writing on 22 May 2025 and 13 October 2025, and we also met with MOH on three occasions, 2 July, 30 October and 11 December 2025, to discuss these matters.

We are glad that some of our concerns on patient privacy and confidentiality have been addressed.

MOH highlighted that the Health Information Act will commence in early 2027. As such, SMA's main focus in 2026 is to help members navigate the complexities of the new law, and we will continue to work with MOH to prepare members for its implementation.

Healthcare Insurance

SMA continued to speak up for the interests of patients and doctors as a member of the Multilateral Healthcare Insurance Committee (MHIC). The focus remains on advocating for greater transparency and improvements in private healthcare insurance. End 2025 marks the end of the current MHIC term, and SMA will continue to participate in the committee with two representatives in the new term beginning 2026.

SMA wrote a letter to the *Straits Times* Forum, published on 26 May 2025, to respond to a recent article on health insurance and healthcare costs. The letter reiterates the Association's stance that any proposed changes should be centred on patients' medical needs. The letter can be viewed at <https://bit.ly/43pUtKe>.

SMA Council member and past President Dr Tan Yia Swam was featured as an interviewee on the 1 August 2025 episode of the Channel 8 Mandarin current affairs programme *Frontline*,

which discussed the topic of Integrated Shield Plans (IPs). Dr Tan emphasised that although running a medical practice is a business, medical professionalism and compassion still matters the most. Dr Tan also noted that insurance companies that suspend the issuing of pre-authorisations will add stress for patients during hospitalisation. SMA wrote a letter to the *Straits Times* Forum, published on 30 September 2025, commenting on questions raised in Parliament relating to the need for regulation of IPs. SMA advocated that well-considered regulatory measures could ensure that insured patients are treated in a fairer way.

Areas that SMA recommended for regulatory considerations include:

- Limiting the turnover of panel specialists.
- Mandatory disclosure of insurers' commercial arrangements with facility providers and penalties, if any, to policyholders and panel doctors for not using preferred facilities.
- Communication of changes affecting coverage or claims, including adequate notice periods.

SMA will continue to push for health equity and fairer treatment of patients and doctors.

Mandatory Medical Ethics

End 2025 marked the completion of the first two-year practising certificate (PC) renewal cycle, where five mandatory medical ethics (MME) continuing medical education (CME) points are required for renewal of a two-year PC. SMA reminded and aided members in fulfilling this new requirement.

The SMA Centre for Medical Ethics and Professionalism (SMA CMEP) organises MME programmes as well as other CME activities. For further details, please refer to the SMA CMEP report on page 18.

Professional Bodies

The three professional bodies – AMS, CFPS and SMA – endeavour to meet twice a year to discuss various issues relating to the healthcare system and professional matters.

A dinner meeting hosted by AMS was organised on 8 April 2025. Topics discussed included the draft Health Information Bill, personal mobility aids and MME.

STRENGTHENING Engagement and Community

SMA has had a remarkable year in 2025, filled with exciting events, meaningful partnerships and opportunities for growth that have strengthened our community of medical professionals. Our Membership Services department's efforts focused on building meaningful connections across the profession – supporting doctors' well-being, encouraging peer networks and reinforcing the value of SMA membership at different stages of practice. This report summarises key engagement outcomes and initiatives delivered over the year.

Member Engagement through Signature Events

SMA's signature events enabled members to connect beyond the clinical setting and recognised contributions within and to the profession.

The SMA Annual Dinner, held on 17 May 2025, was attended by 390 guests, including guest of honour Ms Lai Wei Lin, Permanent Secretary (Policy & Development), and other notable figures in the medical profession. The dinner provided a platform to honour doctors and volunteers who have made significant contributions to SMA or the medical profession.

The Members' Appreciation Night, featuring *Avatar: Fire and Ash*, was held on 19 December 2025 at Golden Village, VivoCity, with a strong turnout of 596 attendees. This event served as a token of our gratitude for SMA members' and volunteers' unwavering support.



The SMA Annual Golf Tournament held on 30 July 2025 attracted 102 golfers, providing an excellent networking opportunity through friendly competition. SMA also launched our inaugural overseas golf trip to Bangkok in January 2026, where 20 golfers and their guests signed up.

Regular interest-based activities and events were held throughout the year to cater to diverse member interests and to sustain consistent touchpoints with members across the year. These events were well received, with members appreciating the variety and quality of activities.

Interest Groups and Community Building

Interest groups continued to play an important role in building communities within SMA, enabling members to connect through shared interests and professional aspirations.

The Healthcare Administrators Interest Group (HAIG) supported doctors exploring leadership and administration pathways. Key initiatives included a fireside chat with Health Sciences Authority CEO Adj Prof Raymond Chua, a "doctropreneur" event where start-up experiences were shared, and the launch of a mentorship programme to support aspiring healthcare administrators looking to grow in the field.



Apart from HAIG's activities, the SMA NK Yong Wine Chapter hosted two events in 2025 featuring curated wine selections and fine dining, providing a relaxed platform for members to network and connect.

These interest groups not only fostered professional development and networking opportunities but also helped build lasting connections among members.

Support for Junior Doctors

Supporting junior doctors remained an important part of SMA's broader member engagement strategy.

The SMA Doctors-in-Training (DIT) Committee continued engaging with key stakeholders on issues relating to junior doctors' practice and well-being and supported junior doctors through resources and engagement platforms. A key development was the formation of a joint workgroup with the Academy of Medicine, Singapore College of Psychiatrists and the College of Public Health and Occupational Physicians to develop guidelines supporting doctors with psychiatric conditions, expected to be published in 2026.

The busy year wrapped up with the MOH Holdings (MOHH) x SMA Junior Doctors Dinner, which brought together more than 280 junior doctors, for a lively and heartwarming evening of camaraderie and appreciation.

Lifestyle Privileges

SMA collaborated with 15 lifestyle partners, offering members a wide range of privileges and discounts. These partnerships provide practical benefits to members and complement SMA's broader engagement and community-building efforts.

Inter-Professional Engagement and Representation

SMA participated in the Inter-Professional Games (IPG) 2025, providing members with opportunities for healthy competition and team bonding while strengthening ties with other professional bodies. Competing in eight sporting events, SMA members claimed the chess championship title and achieved podium finishes in bowling, golf, squash and volleyball, concluding the Games with the Association in fourth place overall.



Engagement with Medical Students

SMA continued its early engagement with future doctors by reaching out to incoming Year 1 medical students across all three local medical schools through student orientation talks. We are pleased to report that all attendees signed up as SMA student members, boosting SMA's student membership base and further expanding our reach and engagement with the medical community. Representatives from both local and overseas medical schools were also invited to attend meetings of the SMA DIT Committee. Additionally, SMA continued to support the annual SMA National Medical Students' Convention, the flagship event of the TriMedSoc Alliance, which is the official student representative body of the three local medical schools.



Platform for Engagement within the Profession

In 2025, the Association's official newsletter – *SMA News* – addressed diverse topics in its monthly issues, including reflections on cultural experiences and professional identity in the January issue, evolving practice trends like telemedicine and its ethical implications in March, and professional development of medical students and doctors beyond the classroom in the October issue. The December issue rounded off the year with thoughtful reflections on family medicine's milestone as a newly recognised specialty, reinforcing our collective sense of purpose as a profession.



Compelling interviews with healthcare leaders, policymakers and clinicians were also carried in the newsletter, offering perspectives on regulation, professional practice and system transformation. Feature articles explored emerging areas of medicine, medico-legal and ethical considerations, as well as practice trends, while the remaining pages provided space for reflection on the lived experiences of students and doctors in different stages of their journeys in medicine.

We extend our sincere appreciation to our Editorial Board members who generously volunteer their time and expertise to shape each issue. In 2025, we bade farewell to past Deputy Editor Dr Tan Tze Lee and welcomed onboard new Editorial Board members Dr Lim Ing Ruen and Dr Tan Chin Yee. This infusion of fresh perspectives and energy will further strengthen our editorial direction and broaden representation across the profession.

SMA News continues to invite participation from medical professionals at all levels as we strive in our role as a member-centric platform for engagement, exchange, learning and community-building, presenting to members a newsletter written by doctors, for doctors.

Advancing Medicine

THROUGH ACADEMIC SUPPORT

SMA supports our members' professional development across every stage of medical training, from medical school through professional practice. Through structured continuing medical education (CME) programmes such as seminars, webinars, online-learning modules and other resources, the Association fosters scholarly growth, lifelong learning and academic excellence, equipping future and practising doctors with the knowledge, skills and confidence for their daily practice.

SMA Centre for Medical Ethics and Professionalism

2025 marked the 25th anniversary of the SMA Centre for Medical Ethics and Professionalism (SMA CMEP), a milestone reflecting its enduring role in advancing medical ethics, professionalism and health law in Singapore. Since its founding in the late 1990s, SMA CMEP has evolved into a national leader in ethics education, delivering structured programmes across seminars, conferences, accreditation courses, publications and mandatory medical ethics (MME) training. Key achievements include the training of thousands of doctors through specialist ethics courses, mental capacity and Lasting Power of Attorney accreditation programmes, expert witness training and the long-running Annual National Medico-Legal Seminar (ANMLS). With the introduction of MME requirements, SMA CMEP has further expanded its reach through accessible, member-supported learning formats, awarding tens of thousands of MME points annually. Guided by a dedicated board of advisors, faculty and successive executive directors, SMA CMEP's work over the past 25 years underscores its commitment to educating, empowering and elevating ethical practice across the medical profession.

Mandatory Medical Ethics CME

In 2025, SMA CMEP delivered a comprehensive suite of MME programmes across distance-learning modules, curated articles, webinars and national-level seminars, recording a total of 26,072 attendances. Participation was strongest in online formats, particularly distance-learning modules and webinars.

MME Distance-Learning Modules

In the reporting year, SMA CMEP's MME distance-learning modules and articles reached a total of 17,578 attendances, awarding CME points proportional to programme requirements. Usage was heavily concentrated among members and peaked sharply during the July to September practising certificate renewal period. Distance-learning modules, covering topics such as informed consent, medical professionalism, privacy and ethical case analysis, engaged doctors across all months, while MME articles – focusing on professionalism, patient welfare and medico-legal principles – consistently drew strong participation. The data reflects sustained member engagement with SMA CMEP's flexible, high-quality online ethics and professional development offerings, underscoring the Centre's role in supporting doctors' ongoing professional competence and ethical practice.

Annual National Medico-Legal Seminar

Over 13 and 14 September 2025, ANMLS 2025, jointly organised by SMA CMEP and the Medico-Legal Society of Singapore, brought together more than 300 doctors, lawyers and allied health professionals at One Farrer

Hotel. Titled "Medical Record Keeping in an Evolving Technological and Regulatory Landscape", the two-day seminar addressed key medico-legal issues relating to medical documentation, the National Electronic Health Record, cybersecurity, and the ethical and practical implications of artificial intelligence in healthcare. Through expert presentations and the well-received panel discussions, speakers emphasised the continued primacy of clinical judgement and professional accountability in an increasingly technology-enabled healthcare environment.

Medical Ethics, Professionalism and Healthcare Course

This two-and-a-half-day mandatory course serves as an exit certification requirement for advanced specialist trainees, family medicine trainees and residents. It comprises core modules on medical professionalism, ethics, law and communication, ensuring that doctors are equipped with a strong grounding in both the technical and ethical dimensions of medical practice – essential to the delivery of high-quality patient care. As of December 2025, SMA CMEP has conducted 86 courses, training a total of 6,070 doctors.

Other CME Programmes

Other than MME CME programmes, SMA also organised offerings including the "Medicine, Doctor and The Law" series, and webinars on cybersecurity and death certification, addressing emerging challenges in medical practice. Collectively, these initiatives reinforced SMA's commitment to empowering doctors with knowledge, upholding professional standards and supporting excellence in patient care.

Editorial Leadership and Capacity Building

The year 2025 marked a significant transition for the *Singapore Medical Journal (SMJ)* with the appointment of Prof Ang Tiing Leong as Editor-in-Chief in January, coinciding with the journal's 65th anniversary. This leadership transition was built on the strong foundations laid by outgoing Editor-in-Chief, Prof Poh Kian Keong, whose decade of stewardship strengthened *SMJ's* editorial standards, reach and relevance. Under the new editorial leadership, *SMJ* reaffirmed its commitment to clinical excellence, rigorous peer review and service to the medical community in Singapore and the region.

A key milestone in 2025 was the successful launch of the inaugural *SMJ* Editorial Fellowship, a one-year structured programme to nurture early-career clinician-researchers with an interest in academic publishing. The fellowship offered hands-on exposure to manuscript evaluation, peer review, editorial decision-making and scholarly writing under the guidance of experienced editors. The six inaugural fellows contributed actively through reviews, editorials and educational resources, including a practical guide to peer review. Building on this success, the second fellowship run commenced on 1 January 2026 with four new fellows. In February 2025, *SMJ* also organised a regional reviewer webinar with the MASEAN Group of Journals, engaging over 150 reviewers to strengthen peer-review standards.

Year in Review – Scholarship and Clinical Relevance

Throughout 2025, *SMJ* published a diverse and clinically relevant body of work encompassing original research, reviews, commentaries and editorials across a wide range of medical disciplines. Articles addressed pressing healthcare issues such as adolescent mental health, post-resuscitation care following out-of-hospital cardiac arrest, colorectal cancer screening, chronic kidney disease management, and physician burnout and resilience. These contributions reinforced *SMJ's* role as a trusted platform for evidence-based clinical practice and policy-relevant discussion.

Public health and systems-level perspectives featured prominently, with commentaries on climate-conscious medical conferences, occupational health in Singapore's green economy, family medicine's role in sustainable healthcare systems, and the national Healthier SG initiative. These articles reflected the journal's responsiveness to evolving healthcare priorities and its alignment with national health transformation efforts.

The journal's growing influence was underscored by an improved journal impact factor of 2.2 (2024), signalling increased citation and international visibility. *SMJ* also continued to benefit from the dedicated contributions of its authors, reviewers and editorial board, whose collective efforts upheld the journal's standards of timeliness, quality and scholarly integrity.

Looking Ahead

As *SMJ* moves into 2026, the journal remains focused on strengthening editorial innovation, mentoring future clinician-editors, and publishing high-quality research that is relevant to clinical practice and healthcare systems. With the continued support of SMA and the wider medical community, *SMJ* is well positioned to build on its momentum, expand its regional impact, and continue serving as a leading voice in medical scholarship for Singapore and beyond.
