# Specialised Care under One Roof

**COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRES** (CHCs) were set up in 2010 to support GPs to better manage chronic diseases in the community. Ancillary services such as diabetic retinal photography (DRP), diabetic foot screening (DFS), nurse counselling and physiotherapy are offered at these CHCs, which complement the clinical care that GPs provide to patients with chronic conditions.

The Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) spoke to Dr Theresa Yap of Yang & Yap Clinic & Surgery, and Dr Adidah Hassan of Adidah Family Clinic & Surgery, who both shared how the CHCs have supported them in providing excellent patient care while significantly improving patient welfare.

AIC: Before the CHCs were established, where did you refer patients to for tests such as annual foot and eye screenings?

Dr Yap: I used to arrange for a mobile DRP clinic to come to my practice once a year. It was quite a logistical nightmare, coordinating patients to all come down on one day, and I also missed out on treating other patients on that day.

Dr Adidah: My patients went to polyclinics for eye checks, but sometimes foot screenings weren't available so I had to send them to hospitals for those. I also referred patients to the Diabetic Society of Singapore.

### AIC: How have the CHCs helped in your work?

Dr Yap: It's much easier to arrange for tests just by referring patients to the CHCs near their homes. The CHC staff will also provide education services and dietetic counselling, which reinforce what I tell my patients. They also remind patients of scheduled yearly check-ups, which saves me the trouble of making subsequent appointments for them.

Dr Adidah: I receive the test reports from the CHCs within one to two weeks, and they helpfully highlight anything that requires further investigation. For example, if they notice from the eye examination that the cup-to-disc ratio is high, they may recommend that the patient consult an eye surgeon in, say, four weeks.



# **CHCs at a glance**

- Located within neighbourhoods
- Staffed only by nurses and allied health professionals, with no doctors on-site
- Provide services that support the management of chronic diseases
- Offer subsidised rates to Community Health Assist Scheme (CHAS) beneficiaries
- Expedite test results so referring GPs can conduct reviews and patient follow-ups quickly

### AIC: What do your patients have to say regarding the CHCs?

Dr Yap: The CHCs' mental health counselling services benefit my patients too. After attending a couple of sessions there, one of my patients with psychosomatic symptoms came back noticeably happier, telling me that she looked forward to her group therapy sessions.

Dr Adidah: The CHCs' centralised locations make them very accessible to many of my patients. In fact, they prefer to go to the CHCs now. With subsidies for CHAS beneficiaries at the CHCs, patients also tell me they find the rates very affordable.

### AIC: What do you like about the CHCs?

Dr Yap: The teamwork and support they offer us. It's easier to make appointments now, and they help me keep track of my patients' regular screenings. I am assured that the CHC staff will do a proper job, especially since they have all the necessary equipment and training to conduct the tests. These regular screenings also occasionally detect other problems like cataracts and glaucoma, for which we refer to the specialist outpatient clinics. These timely interventions help save patients' precious eyesight.

Dr Adidah: These one-stop centres provide all these ancillary services that we GPs can use, for the convenience of our patients, and eventually patients come back to us for their treatment. They benefit both patients and us GPs.
